#### Lets take a look at OBEDIENCE......

Hi. My name is Dianne Western and I have belonged to the Rotorua Dog Obedience Club since 2006. I compete with 3 dogs. One in Test A one in Test B and one in Test C. I'm going to try and tell you a little about Competition Obedience.

When you start in Obedience there are 6 classes to compete in. Elementary, Beginners, Novice, Test A, Test B, Test C. The 1st level is Elementary. You are in the ring with your dog competing against like level competitors. Anyone who had won out of that class can't come back into Elementary with that dog. And no one who has won out of Beginners with any dog can come back to elementary or Beginners. It would be best to get someone to help train you. I.e. give you instruction on what and how to go about training for going in the ring. What got me into Obedience was watching a Test C handler do Distance control with her dog. Then I started to learn about the sport.

The elementary course has 4 parts to it. Heel work. Recall. Sit stay. And down stay. Each part has its own points allocated to it.

The 1st exercise is heel work. It is a short heel work course where the handler starts with the dog by the handlers left leg at a sit. You can talk to your dog as much as you like but you can't touch your dog. It is desirable that the dog is close to your leg at the sit and throughout the course except in recall and stays. The steward will give you instructions to follow. They are. Are you ready? Forward, about turn, and right turn Halt.

Recalls are where you leave you dog in a sit or a down and walk away. Handler halts and about turns on stewards commands. On stewards command you call your dog to present in a sit in front of you.

Stays are all in together. Also you are facing your dog once having waked the distance that the steward says. About 6 to 10 steps. You are lined up in a line. There has to be 1.5 meters between each dog. On stewards commands you have you dog sitting. Stewards command are all dogs sitting, are you ready leave your dog. Halt about turn and wait the 30 sec. On stewards command return to you dog. Here you circle your dog back to the heel work position and steward will say exercise finished. Same for down stays. During their stays you aren't allowed to talk to your dog.

So that all seems a lot but it can be done with patience and training. Oh did I mention that you aren't allowed food or toys in the ring.

If you are interested then let the club know and did I mention the pretty ribbons and prizes that are from 1st to 5th. Lovely memories.

I have had 13 years of competing having got two dogs Test C Qualified. I have travelled all over the country both in the North Is and the South. Represented the club and the Northern Region at National Dog Obedience Assembly in the team's 3 times This a completion that is between regions. North Central and South. I was in a winning team one year... I have won at the National Dog Show in Novice and gained highest % points in obedience at that show. Yes I have trained hard with my dogs but it's a great hobby and you make many friends. With that I leave you wanting to know

more, I hope.



The committee would love to hear from you if you are keen to train your dog in an Obedience class.



There will be 1 hide per search, 4 hides to be found in total. Judging will be done concurrently and no search times will be recorded, prizes will be Judge's choice for each section. Food and videoing is allowed in the search areas. If there is demand, the hides will be moved and another set of searches will be held or those wishing to run a second dog or do it twice.

Cost: \$5 per search per dog.
